

Tool 6 – Reflecting on my teaching approaches

Task: Reflect on your own teaching with regard to languages and cultures

- What opportunities do the children in my classroom have to share different language and cultural experiences:
 - o As part of the curriculum?
 - As part of the daily classroom practices?
- How do I observe, assess, and document the language skills of the children in my class:
 - o In the language of the education system?
 - o In any additional languages taught as part of the curriculum?
- How do you observe, assess, and document the skills of any children that speak additional languages not included in the official curriculum?

How can these be used to support the diverse language learning pathways of children?

- What additional opportunities can you create as part of the normal teaching and learning process to include different languages and cultural experiences?
- How can you use your existing pedagogical knowledge and experience to support the children's additional languages (including home or community languages)?
- What can you do you to create a safe and inclusive learning environment where children feel comfortable to share their language and cultural practices with the other children and the adults in the educational setting?





- How can you involve:
 - Different resources for example technology or multilingual books
 - Parents or community members

to make the different language learning pathways of the children visible in the classroom and the wider education setting?

 What skills or knowledge do you want to (further) develop to support the different language learning pathways of the children in your setting?
